Fall, Fires & Open Burning



Watch this DEQ Minute video to learn about open burning laws in Michigan.

There are currently around 50 large incident fires burning across the U.S.

The devastation wrought by these events is catastrophic for both humans and wildlife. While the cause of some of these fires is that of a natural occurrence, recent studies show that nationwide, 84% of all forest fires are caused by humans.

In 2016, 60,932 human-caused wildfires burned nearly 4 million acres

With this in mind, please use caution while enjoying your outdoor camp fires this fall and remember that state and local laws prohibit open burning of many materials.

The burning of trees, logs, brush, and stumps may be allowed by first obtaining a burn permit. Many burn permits simply require a short phone call with a DNR or local municipality representative. Visit www.michigan.gov/burnpermit for more information and to determine who and when a burn permit is needed.
